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The New Year and Prayer: Yours, Mine and Ours

Years ago, in the middle of a very relaxed, kitchen conversation about praying amid life's ups and downs, one of my closest friends asked me, "do you really believe in God's agency?" It was the kind of heady, out-of-left-field type of question that you would expect between two friends with the ink still wet on their graduate degrees in theology.

Don't worry. I am not going to try to unpack "God's agency" in these few hundred words. It took the Church a few hundred years, through the early councils of Constantinople, Chalcedon, et al. to wrestle that out.

In fact, I knew that he was really asking a much simpler question. One that we all ask trying to make sense of life's ups and downs, "do you really believe that God hears and answers prayers?"

Yes, I really do believe God hears and answers prayers. Jesus tells me ("whatever you ask for in prayer with faith, you will receive." Mt.21:22), the Church testifies ("If our prayer is resolutely united with that of Jesus, in trust and boldness as children, we obtain all that we ask in his name, even more than any particular thing: the Holy Spirit himself, who contains all gifts." CCC#2741), and I can bear witness to specific times of God's real, tangible presence as I prayed.

And yet, I think there was a second, unspoken dimension to my friend's question, more important than "what's the right answer." He wasn't just looking for an answer to a theological question. He was looking for a fellow pray-er. He seeks, as perhaps we all do, the reassurance of having companions on the journey. The moment when "I believe" becomes "we believe." The realization that when he prays and I pray, we pray.

My hope for this new year is that all of us can embrace in a renewed, passionate way this dimension of prayer – "our" prayer. I would put it this way. As you spend time in prayer – private, liturgical, vocal, silent – take a moment to "look around." Take time to look around, of course physically as we gather as a family at Mass for example, but more, raise your heart and mind to God, be still, and look around and be aware of so many others praying with you and for you.

It is a great grace and a tremendous comfort that, right now, this very moment... someone, somewhere is praying for you! We walk together, serve His people together, and pray together.

As we begin 2019, it is a fitting time to recall the past year and ask for the grace to see and understand how we have been surrounded by the prayers of others. Then we can cast our gaze to the year ahead full of hope and peace resting in the assurance that yes, God hears and answers our prayers.

I am praying for you, your family and friends, and your ministry. Count on it. And, it gets even better. Look around and you will see an entire Church – our family of faith – praying together, for you, for me, for each other right now. - D.J. Florian

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults: Frequently Asked Questions

The use of the Roman Ritual, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA, 1988 United States edition) is mandatory for the initiation of adults and children of catechetical age. The National Statutes for the Catechumenate (NSC) are to be observed (See RCIA, Appendix III).

Where pastorally necessary, a local (inter-parish) form of catechetical sessions during the catechumenate may be observed; however, in such cases, each parish should take responsibility for the welcome and pastoral care of members and the celebration of the rites for its community.

The ministry of the catechumenate is concerned with welcoming people to the sacraments of initiation. It should be kept distinct from parish efforts for reconciling the alienated and for continuing adult enrichment.

For whom is this Rite intended?

The Rite is intended for unbaptized adults and children of catechetical age (over the age of reason).

For whom can the Rite be adapted?

Some of the Rite can be adapted for uncatechized, baptized Christians preparing for full communion with the Catholic Church. The emphasis is on "uncatechized." The understanding is that these persons were baptized as infants yet never brought up in the faith of their baptism.

Catechesis for baptized candidates should help them come to know and appreciate the grace and power of God that already lives within them through their baptism. Their journey with us is one to full communion not to baptism. (RCIA, Part 11, Chapter 4)

Some of the Rite may also be adapted for baptized, uncatechized Catholics who are seeking to complete their initiation by the celebration of confirmation and first Eucharist. Once again, the emphasis is on

"uncatechized". These persons were baptized as infants, but never brought up in the faith and thus never received confirmation and first Communion.

Can baptized Catholics who have received first Communion and confirmation and are returning to the Church be a part of the RCIA process?

No. The journey of persons returning to the church is not a journey to baptism. It is a journey to reconciliation. Their experiences of the Church, their questions, and their pastoral needs are different from those of catechumens and candidates and require a different pastoral response on the part of the Church. Programs are available to help parishes work with returning Catholics.

Can baptized Catholics who have received first Communion, but have not received confirmation be a part of the RCIA process?

No. It is proper for a parish to prepare these adults for confirmation and then send them to the cathedral. The Bishop has reserved for himself all adult confirmations (over 18 years of age).

Can unbaptized catechumens and baptized candidates participate in the same catechetical instruction classes?


Yes, they may. However, it may require additional explanations due to the difference in prior knowledge. In many of our parishes the unbaptized catechumens and the baptized candidates meet.

How long does the process take?

The National Statutes for the Catechumenate state that the time spent in the catechumenate proper should be at least one liturgical year. This is so catechumens can experience the elements of one full liturgical year, which is necessary for complete catechesis, and have enough time to apprentice into the community faith and life. (RCIA, 75) Please keep in mind, the process takes as long as is necessary for each individual person to come to conversion.


The day will cover topics such as:

Lessons from Valentine

Don't go to Mass on Valentine's Day expecting to hear of love and marriage or even St. Valentine. February 14 has new honorees: SS. Cyril and Methodius. Perhaps "new" is misleading, since this changed in 1969. Yet Rome singled out its hometown martyr Valentine for 1500 years, so the switch hasn't widely registered even 50 years later. Why would Rome displace Valentine? The answers pertain to more than just his feast day.

Some say the Church became embarrassed by saints whose existence is doubtful, revoking the sainthood of those without reliable historical records (and whose unreliable records were most miraculous). This is not completely mistaken. Some saints' life-stories were written more as narrative faith formation than as history and downgrading their prominence can avert misunderstanding. However, quite importantly, the Church eliminated feast days, not the saints themselves! Americans doubt that George Washington chopped down a cherry tree; they don't doubt his very existence. Similarly, we may be may be less certain than before about Valentine's miracles and manner of death, but the Roman Martyrology, an official catalog of saints, still records the death "of St. Valentine, martyr, in Rome on the Flaminian Way near the Milvian Bridge." Other "downgraded" saints have similarly terse entries.

If they remain saints, why remove their feasts? Because the Lord does not extend the year each time he raises up a new saint. The *Martyrology* organizes saints according to calendar day, and for every saint assigned liturgical commemoration there are multiple entries not receiving the honor (including a second Saint Valentine on February 14!). A few criteria guide these choices. First, not every day can honor saints. We also need space to reflect on *Christ's* life. Overabundant saints' days should

not threaten to overshadow Advent and Christmas, Lent and Easter. Having reserved room for those seasons, the Church determines who, among the cloud of witnesses, is most important to recall. To whom are Catholics most devoted? Whose holiness is most famed or provides a most timely example?

These answers vary by region, so the Church mandates some feasts for the whole world and leaves days free for nations or dioceses to honor saints cherished locally. Answers also vary from age to age, requiring periodic reconsideration. Is devotion to the Forty Martyrs as fervent as long ago? Should ancient feasts give way to show the modern Church's more global face? Should saints shrouded in mystery outshine those known in great detail? That last point counted against Valentine, especially when card- and candy givers had often forgotten the saint himself. On the bright side, the same dynamic that let Valentine fade from view made room for Therese of Lisieux and Maximilian Kolbe to take the world stage, just as it allowed Americans to celebrate Elizabeth Ann Seton and others of our nation's own. The calendar will, eventually, be updated again. If you truly love Valentine, take heart; he might return by popular demand. But if he doesn't, will you be my Cyril and Methodius?

Young Adult Leadership Institute Enrollment Open for 2019 Cohort

In collaboration with the Catholic Information Center (CIC), the diocesan Office for Family, Youth and Young Adult ministries will again be offering an interactive formation experience for young adults in their 20-30's who aspire to leadership.

The Young Adult Leadership Institute provides the opportunity, through the lens of the Gospel, to (1) identify (or re-affirm) strengths and gifts, (2) build a broader vision of the call to missionary discipleship, and (3) provide a community of practice.

The overall focus of the curriculum is to foster engagement in Church and the local community; an engagement guided by Church teaching and driven by Gospel values.

One of the starting points is the pastoral letter Called and Gifted for the Third Millennium in which U.S. Bishops articulate four calls - to holiness, to community, to mission and ministry, and to adulthood/Christian maturity. The other starting point has been young adults

themselves. A program team of young adults, together with staff, are planning this year's program.

Participants in the Leadership Institute explore and develop a variety of leadership skills including conflict resolution, dialogue, collaboration, intercultural competencies, discernment, and prayer.

The five month program begins and ends with a retreat and will include monthly formation and opportunities to network and socialize with other Catholic leaders in the west Michigan area.

A Time to Heal Racism Multimedia Youth Arts Contest

Each year, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) offers *Creating on the Margins* – a multi-media art contest to help engage young people in learning about the root causes of poverty and the Church's response.

The 2019 contest theme is "A Time to Heal Racism".

Youth in grades 7-12 learn about poverty in the U.S., its causes, Catholic social teaching, and the work of Catholic groups to address poverty. Youth will then work to educate others through creative work of any medium (e.g. video, song, painting, drama, poetry, etc.).

The entries will be judged locally and the top entries will receive a local prize and be sent to the national contest for the final round of judging. The grand prize winner receives \$500 plus a matching grant for a

CCHD funded anti-poverty organization and a trip to a national conference. Second and third place prizes may also be awarded. Last year's national winner, Lana Chalfoun, was from the Diocese of Grand Rapids!

Guadalupe Mission: River of Love

From December 8 to 12, three special guests from Mexico City were in our diocese to do a series of presentations on the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe:

Returning Citizens to Our World

Prison and Jail Ministry offered a training for Guiding Returning Citizens to Our World (GROW) volunteers on Tuesday, November 13. GROW is an outreach ministry of the Diocese of Grand Rapids for those returning from incarceration. The training was facilitated by program director, Tricia Worrell and Officer Dan Myers, prisoner re-entry/parole liaison officer for GRPD.

Trained GROW volunteers will now welcome returning citizens to their parish communities as needed. They will welcome them by accompanying them to Mass, providing information on appropriate opportunities to become involved in their parish and introduce them to the pastor and parish staff. This outreach effort is important because many men and women being released are looking for a welcoming faith community, but do not know how to begin this process. GROW helps guide people returning from incarceration to a church home and helps meet their spiritual needs.

In addition to guiding returned citizens to a church home, GROW also helps educate parish communities through a panel discussion titled, "Why Welcome All?" This Panel travels to various parishes to educate their community on re-entry. This panel includes a returned citizen, a prison reentry and parole liaison officer and the coordinator for Offenders Success for the Michigan Department of Corrections.

Christmas Drive 2018

Our annual Christmas Drive was once again, extremely successful. We are grateful for the 22 parishes who participated in this drive and helped to collect over 2,500 socks, thousands of travel size toiletries and hundreds of reading glasses. In addition to those items, we received numerous monetary donations which helped purchase Rice Krispy treats, candy canes, rosaries, bookmarks and pencils. During the second week of Advent, we sorted, packaged and distributed these items to six county jails, three juvenile detention centers and six prisons.

We delivered 142 bags to our juvenile detention centers containing bookmarks, candy canes, pencils and numerous travel size hygiene items. In addition, we delivered 205 gift bags to those attending Catholic services in our prisons. These bags included small prayer books, bookmarks, rosaries and rosary pamphlets. In addition, we delivered 2,500 socks and 2,560 Rice Krispy treats to our county jails. Throughout this next year, we will continue to supply our county jails with reading glasses and toiletries as needed.

Aquinas College continues to partner with the Diocese to offer those associated with the Diocese extraordinary reductions off normal tuition rates.

There are three ways adults (generally 23 and over) who are associated with the Diocese can access a 50% tuition reduction.

The Donnelly Scholarship - for part-time and full-time parish, school and Diocesan employees - provides a 50% tuition scholarship for any number of classes at the undergraduate or graduate level.

- To earn a degree or take any number of classes for personal or professional development.
- Once received, it can be used for up to seven years or until graduation, whichever occurs sooner, as long as one remains an employee.
- In the last number of years, over 40 employees received over \$101,000.00 in tuition assistance through this scholarship program.
- Applications for those working in the schools are available in the Diocesan Office of Catholic Schools. Those who work in parishes and Diocesan employees can contact Sr. Barbara Cline, FSE at (616) 551-4742.

The Certificate in Theological Studies

All students in the Theological Certificate program receive a fee waiver of 50% for a limited time as an encouragement for enrollment in this six-course program.

- The Certificate was designed over 15 years ago at the request of the Diocese and is for lay people engaged in ministry and those who want to further their theological education and deepen their understanding of the Faith.
- The six courses in Theological Studies meet the credit requirements for "Master Catechist" certification by the Diocese.

Diocesan Parish Volunteer Program

Church personnel who are volunteers may apply to receive a 50% tuition scholarship to take Theology courses.

- This program encourages parish volunteers to continue to grow in their faith and share their education with fellow parishioners.
